Social insurance programs:

Unemployment benefits, paid sick leave, social security contribution waiver or subsidy, healthcare insurance support

Active labor market programs:

Wage subsidies, training, labor market regulations, reduced work time

The trade-offs in social protection

- Comprehensive coverage, timely distribution, and sustained and sufficient support are often competing goals of social protection. Limited resources force unpleasant trade-offs between them
- These trade-offs can be eased by improved delivery capabilities, from digital inclusion to effective governance
- The contrast between East Asia & Pacific and Latin America is illustrative:
 - Latin America had preexisting systems of social protection but lacked financial inclusion, fiscal resources, and digital inclusion to use those systems effectively during the pandemic: Only 10% of the population were helped with small amounts, minor even to minimum wages (UNDP 2020)
 - East Asia & Pacific, in contrast, did not have the social protection systems but was able to scale up, to some extent, support to families because it had the preexisting capabilities. EAP will be well-advised to develop permanent social protection systems (World Bank 2020)

Assessing success in the support to firms



The trade-offs in supporting firms

- Ensuring firm continuity and allowing for renewal and innovation may also be competing goals of firm support
- These trade-offs can be eased by improving the targeting of support (to firms most affected and most able to recover) and increasing overall economic productivity (e.g., digital transformation) (Apedo-Amah et al. 2020, and Vargas Da Cruz et al. 2020)
- The contrast between the approaches in the Europe and US is illustrative:
 - In Europe (especially Germany and France), support was given directly to firms conditional on keeping employment. This led to low unemployment and firm stability
 - In the US, support was given primarily to unemployed workers and to a lower extent to firms themselves. This led to a spike of unemployment but possibly also higher innovation and firm flexibility (Betcherman and Testaverde 2020)
 - A compromise between the two approaches may be best, recognizing the importance of stability in the middle of the crisis and of transformation in the aftermath (Didier, Huneeus, Larrain, and Schmukler 2020)

Resilience and reform

Sine qua non of economic recovery: Resolution of the pandemic

"Smart" public health policies (testing/tracing/isolating, insulating the vulnerable, wearing masks, reasonable social distancing) will be crucially needed until the vaccine is obtained and deployed and community immunity is achieved

Beyond quick recovery, long-term resilience as a goal
